COLOR is everywhere! Color is what your eye sees on all surfaces. There are three **primary** colors that make up all the colors that you can see: **red, yellow, and blue.** With this project you will be using light to mix color and make colorful shadows and create a vibrant **COLOR CATCHER!**

On the South side of the Skyway at the Intersection of Broadway and 2nd Ave N, Fargo

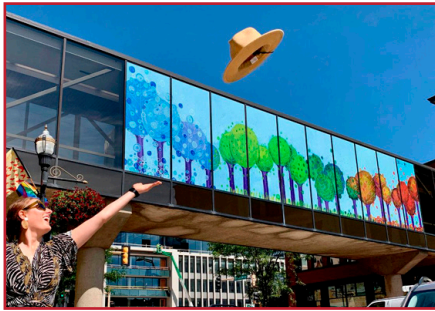


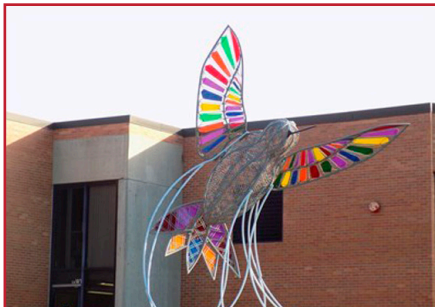

Quest 3

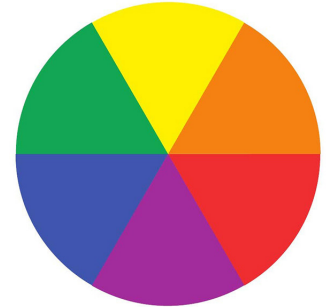
Color Blending

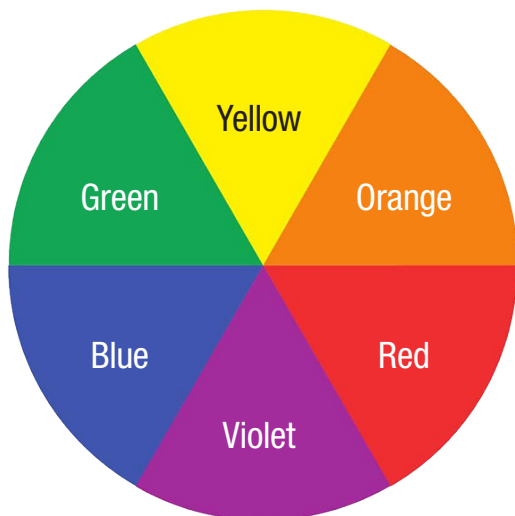

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Color is what your eye sees on all surfaces. There are three **primary colors** that make up all the colors that you can see: **red**, **yellow**, and **blue**.

When you mix the neighboring primary colors with each other you make **secondary colors**; **orange**, **violet**, and **green**.



Supplies include

- 2 wood dowels
- 1 pipecleaner
- 1 skein of embroidery floss
- Colored acetate sheets
- Clear stickers
- You will need scissors for this project!

Steps

- Explore the materials, name the colors in your kit
- Cut shapes from your color acetate sheets.
- Wire dowels together to form an “X” - it’s a little tricky, make sure the wire wraps in between each dowel!
- Using your string, tie two opposite dowel ends together to create a hanging method.
- Use your string and tie long pieces onto each end of the dowel
- Tape your colorful shapes onto the long pieces of string
- Hang in a sunny or bright place for optimal experience!
