LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR

DEAR SUPPORTERS,



Plains Art Museum has enjoyed great momentum on multiple fronts this past year. We've presented a robust exhibition calendar, accessioned landmark works of art, grown our

community and wellness programming, and made major strides on our capital campaign, *Connections*. Our gallery attendance continues to grow, as does our monetary public support. This demonstrates the commitment of our community to Plains, and the museum's ability to attract new visitors and donors. As we look back on this past year, I am profoundly grateful to all of our donors, members, and volunteers for steadfastly supporting the mission and work of Plains Art Museum.

Plains' mission is to connect art, artists, and audiences to foster creative, resilient, and welcoming communities. Our mission guides the museum's work, and is reflected across all sectors of the institution, from our permanent collection, to our exhibitions, to our programming and studio classes. Over the last twelve months, we've continued to fulfill our mission, both in the immediate, and with an eye to the future.

We've been incredibly fortunate to accession a treasure trove of artworks into our permanent collection; for our visitors to enjoy now, and for those in future generations to appreciate and learn from. Our largest gift comes from master printmaker Steven M Andersen, who generously gifted Plains his personal archive, including works spanning his career, and works by those he has

printed for, such as Ed Ruscha. Other notable works include a permanent mural commissioned from Jaque Fragua, a monumental sculpture by Minnesota based artist Aaron Spangler, a lithograph by Robert Motherwell, and several works on paper by Judith Roode.

While our permanent collection is a gift for both the present and the future, our exhibitions are more fleeting, generally running for three to six months. We presented a diverse exhibition slate this past fiscal year, with major exhibitions including works from the private collection of the Icy Gays, selections from Don Powell's modernist collection, a dialogue around global water rights, including photography from Sierra Gorda, Mexico and Standing Rock, and *Floating Beauty: Women in the Art of Ukiyo-e*, on loan from Reading Public Museum. Additional exhibitions are highlighted on page 12; with twenty shows on view over the past twelve months, it is fair to say there is always something new to see and discover at Plains!

Our programming and studio classes reflect our commitment to offering opportunities for all to participate in. From our ever popular Tuesdays for Toddlers program, in collaboration with Fargo Public Library, to our Art + Autism workshops, led by community experts, all are welcome to come make, learn, and explore at Plains.

As we reflect on the past year, I again want to thank all of our supporters for continuing to enable the work of Plains. We're proud to be a leader in the arts in the Upper Midwest and look forward to the work to come in 2026.

SELECT PROGRAMS, PROJECTS & INITIATIVES

PLAINS ART CASES

The Museum's Art Case program is designed to provide art education resources to classrooms in our region that have little or no formal art education in place. Each case is packed with a miniature exhibition of works by regional artists and comes with an education guide that encourages classroom participation. The cases are loaned for free and educators pay no shipping fees.

ART CAMP

Art Camp, hosted by Plains Art Museum and presented by NDSU's School of Design, Architecture and Art, is a celebration of artistic talent from high school students in our region. Beyond the exhibition, Art Camp at NDSU invites students to engage in a variety of art-making experiences. High School students participating in Art Camp are invited to a full day of creativity at NDSU's Renaissance Hall where students dive into interactive workshops and learn from artists and designers working here in our community.

KID QUEST

Kid Quest is a free, family program, held the first Saturday of the month from October through April. The event draws around 200 children and family members each month, offering them the opportunity to explore art in the galleries and then participate in creating an art project together at the Katherine Kilbourne Burgum Center for Creativity. Xcel Energy is the primary sponsor, with additional support from Minnesota Public Radio.

STUDIO CLASSES

Art-making classes for youth and adults offer opportunities for inquisitive people of all ages. Classes are held at the Katherine Kilbourne Burgum Center for Creativity, a multipurpose arts facility that also offers studio and exhibition space for learning, discussion, and display of creative work. Plains Art Museum's studio programs focus on developing people's potential for deeper learning and problem solving through 21st-century skills: creativity, collaboration, critical thinking, and communication. The Bradley J. Burgum skybridge connects the original museum building with this 25,500 square foot expansion.

OPEN STUDIO

Members are invited to work on ceramic projects during Open Studio hours offered four days a week in the Katherine Kilbourne Burgum Center for Creativity, in an atmosphere where people can come together to work on projects—experimenting, collaborating, and encouraging fellow artists.

TUESDAYS FOR TODDLERS

A time for our youngest visitors and their grown-ups to foster creativity and imagination through stories, songs, and hands-on art activities. Each month we will offer a unique theme and a new art project for the child to create and take home. Recommended for children ages 2-5. Siblings, younger than two, can accompany the group for free.



SELECT PROGRAMS, PROJECTS & INITIATIVES

ART + AUTISM WORKSHOPS

All sessions are developed and instructed by Plains Art Museum Education Staff and Special Education professionals for families with children on the Autism Spectrum Disorder.

SENSORY SUNDAYS

We embrace the unique qualities of all who walk through our doors and appreciate that many visitors need to explore the Museum in different ways. For individuals and families who prefer a quiet, less sensory-stimulating environment we offer Low-Sensory Sundays on the first Sunday afternoon of every month. At each event, loud gallery sounds and bright lights are turned down and attendance is limited.

HANNAHER'S INC. PRINT STUDIO

This space is designed as a place to explore the art of printmaking in all its various forms. The Museum is one of only a handful in the nation with a fully functional print studio.

THE GOLDBERG ART LOUNGE

In this hands-on learning space for all ages, visitors have the opportunity to learn in a relaxed environment through art activities, games, books.

HERITAGE GARDEN & AMPHITHEATER

Designed by artists Su Legatt, Rob Fischer, and Kevin Johnson, the Heritage Garden & Amphitheater is located near the site of the decommissioned power plant along the Red River and adjacent to Woodlawn Park. The power plant provided power to Moorhead from 1896 until 2014, and was a central element to the Woodlawn Park neighborhood. The artists' plan has created an environment that serves as an

homage to the power plant, the history of the neighborhood and its residents. Elements from the power plant are incorporated into landforms and garden beds, and serve as found sculptures. Residents from the neighborhood have contributed plants and their personal stories.

BUZZ LAB TEEN COLLECTIVE

Buzz Lab is an opportunity during summer for teens who are between ages 12-18 years old and passionate about art, science, and protecting the environment. Participants will dive into learning, creating, and advocating for the essential role of pollinators in a thriving ecosystem. They will work with scientists, artists, and community members to learn and discuss the importance of pollinators, create collaborative artwork, and participate in gardening and research in the Pollinator Garden at Plains Art Museum and other sites

ANNUAL SPRING GALA

Held annually on the first Saturday of May, the Museum's largest fundraiser raises money for its education programs. It features live music, hors d'oeuvres, as well as the area's largest wine tasting and art auction.

ARTS ON PRESCRIPTION

Arts on Prescription is designed for medical students, residents, physicians, and other healthcare professionals to explore themes of wellness, reflection, and restoration through creative engagement. Hosted by Plains Art Museum and coordinated by Dr. Kasey Johnson from UND's School of Medicine and Health Sciences, this session features guided prompts, small-group reflections, and contemplative activities inspired by the therapeutic potential of art. Grounded in "social prescribing," the event highlights how creative practices can foster emotional resilience and community connection. Paired with light refreshments and Anne Labovitz's transformative exhibition *Convergence: Health & Creativity*, this gathering offers a restorative space for meaningful dialogue and renewal.
